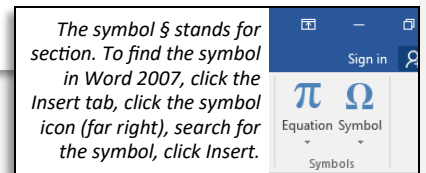

In the text it may be necessary to cite specific subsections, as in the following example:

The Minnesota Board of Marriage and Family Therapy Code of Ethics (2009), subpart 6B, requires a therapist to explain to clients the limits of confidentiality. Subpart 6K(3) gives clients right of access to their own data record. (BMFT Code of Ethics, 2009).
